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**R**epoussé is a metalworking technique in which a malleable metal is ornamented or shaped by hammering from the reverse side to create a design in low relief. There are few techniques that offer such diversity of expression while still being relatively economical, Chasing is the opposite technique to repoussé, and the two are used in conjunction to create a finished piece. It is also known as embossing. We really simplified this process by working in relief heavy-duty aluminum foil, foam using picnic plates, and matboard. The children used permanent markers to add colors. This project/ was so popular that several students made more than one!
